Family Learning Opportunity - Digital Literacy/Online Safety

ERASE Learning Sessions

Three virtual ERASE learning sessions for families and children will be held on November 8, 28, and 30, focusing on establishing safe, caring, and respectful digital communities. These online sessions are best suited for families and youth aged 10 and above.

Family Session: Establishing Safe, Caring, & Respectful Digital Communities – Everyone Welcome!

Details: Recommended for Parents/Caregivers/Grandparents and youth aged 10 and up as a way to facilitate the conversation of safe and caring use of technology at home and in the community. This session covers all things digital, from how to be a good digital citizen, the criminal consequences of cyberbullying, and how to report and receive support in cases of sexting/sextortion. Some of the most prominent concerns currently surrounding use of social media platforms, smartphones, and artificial intelligence will be discussed.

Students will learn:

 \cdot Digital media habits, oversharing, and digital addiction

·The permanence of online posts/activity

• The significance of your digital tattoo in how others perceive you (e.g., sports teams, college admissions, and potential employers)

• The importance of caring for peers both online and offline

·Geo-locational settings and the dangers of social media and cell phone misuse

• The social and legal consequences of cyberbullying behaviour as well as possession and distribution of intimate images (sexting and sextortion)

 \cdot An anonymous student reporting tool that can help you and your friends stay safe both online and offline

Teaching Tidbits to Help at Home

Syllables....you probably know them as units of sound we use to divide words. Maybe you count them, clap them out or segment words on paper. But did you know that there are SIX (or some count SEVEN to include diphthongs) different types of syllables?


A syllable is a word, or a part of a word, with one vowel sound. You count syllables by listening to how many vowel sounds you hear in a single word.

We know vowels and vowel combinations can make all different sounds, so knowing the different kinds of syllables helps students to determine what sound the vowels will make. When we align our instruction to the Science of Reading, we know that teaching these different syllable types to our students will help them decode bigger, more complex words and become more effective readers!

ACTIVITY:

When shopping, driving, or getting ready in the morning, point out an item you see and see if they can figure out how many beats / syllables they hear.

Ex: toothpaste (tooth / paste) = 2 syllables
